According to unofficial returns, in the Beaverdam precinct in Beaverdam Township, special school district No. 1, the election carried by 14 votes for the continuation of the special school tax in the election held there Tuesday to decide the question, the vote was as follows: For con-

tinuing the tax, 43; against continuing the tax, 38.

There were 81 votes cast in the election out of 95 registered voters.

Seek To Eradicate Bovine Tuberculosis In Cherokee County

Mr. A. A. Husman, of the Federal Bureau of Animal Industry, with headquarters at Raleigh, spent several days in Cherokee, Clay and Graham Counties this week in the interest of getting these counties to cooperate with the State and Federal Governments to put on a campaign for the eradication of Tuberculosis among the cows of these counties.

Mr. Husman stated that all of the 100 counties of North Carolina either had finished or are conducting these campaigns, to eliminate tuberculosis from all dairy animals in the state. Work was completed in Macon County this week, and Swain and Jackson are in the midst of campaigns in those counties.

Mr. Husman is working in co-operation with the county, state and federal government. The proposition will be presented to the board of county commissioners at their next meeting for consideration.
