

MOTORCADE OF 1,500 MILES PLANNED OVER A. S. H.

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tion headquarters and an elaborate dinner will be served on the roof garden on the evening of October 12. A majority of the delegates to the convention will come in the big motorcade which is to be run from Asheville to Atlanta. This motorcade, backed by the officials of the national association and sponsored by the Asheville Chamber of Commerce, the Asheville newspapers and the Asheville civic organizations, will leave that city on the morning of Monday, October 11. Luncheon will be had at Murphy and the night will be spent at Gainesville, where extensive plans for the entertainment of the tourists are now being made by President Estes and a committee of citizens.

The motorcade will arrive in Atlanta on the morning of Tuesday, October 12, and will be taken directly to the Southeastern fair grounds at Lakewood park, where, Tuesday, probably will be set aside as Appalachian Scenic Highway day, and where special arrangements will be made for the entertainment and pleasure of the visitors, including a barbecue or dinner. Tuesday evening the tourists will be entertained at an elaborate dinner at the Ansley hotel. Wednesday morning and early Wednesday afternoon will be devoted to the convention proceedings. After the adjournment of the convention Wednesday afternoon the tourists will be taken on automobile trips around the city and on Wednesday evening they will be the guests at a dance and theater party. All the social clubs will extend courtesy cards to the visitors who will be invited to play on the golf courses and otherwise enjoy the club privileges.

POSTMASTERS OF N. C. IN SESSION

Need For Membership Drive Stressed At Greensboro

Greensboro, July 12.—About 100 postmasters, members of the North Carolina branch of the National League of District Postmasters, in the first day of a two-day annual convention here today, were welcomed to the city, heard addresses on methods in accounting, finance and other phases of postoffice work; were given a ride over the city, and were informed by the president and secretary of the organization of the work of the branch in the past year.

Clyde H. Jarrett, of Andrews, president of the branch, gave an account of the activities of the organization in the past year. He urged a membership campaign on the part of every member of the branch, stating that the number of postmasters in North Carolina is about 1,500 but the branch has a membership of only about 200.

The report of Miss Sallie K. Wilkins, of Magnolia, secretary of the State branch was an interesting one. It, too, showed the need of a membership drive. She reported 200 members with probably a few more to enroll in a short while, while the branch has a potential membership of over 1,400. But she stated that good gains have been made. In the past year, the membership has increased more than it did in the previous 18 months. She also reported on finances of the organization, receipts, disbursements and other matters.

E. A. Meeks, vice-president of the National League of District Postmasters was slated to make an address but a telegram was read from him in which he expressed regret that another engagement prevented his attending the convention.

Hoffman, president of the Atlanta chamber of commerce; Roger Miller, executive of commerce; Mayor Hill of Murphy, N. C., and Preston Arkwright, president of the Georgia Railway and Power Company.
