MURPHY'S NEW FILTER PLANT IS COMPLETED

engineer and contractor have personally inspected it, which, as Mr. Quinn pointed out, is a thing they seldom ever do, and they take great pride in their accomplishment for the town of Murphy.

The site of the plant is furnished by W. V. N. Powelson and the Carolina-Tennessee Power Company for a period of twenty years for and in consideration of the city taxes on Patterson field.

The bronze name plate, which is placed just outside the building beside the entrance, carries the following inscription:

"Town of Murphy, North Carolina. Council: W. M. Fain, Mayor; W. W. Hyde, E. P. Hawkins, J. B. Storey, W. D. Townson, J. H. Phaup; B. W. Sipe, clerk and treasurer. Designed and built by J. B. McCrary Engineer. Incorporation, Atlanta, Ga., 1926."

This supply of water from the new plant, supplementing the 200,000 gallon output of the old plant upon Fain's Mountain, assures plenty of water for Murphy for a number of years, and it has been so built that other units can be added to the new plant without disturbing its function, as the growth and needs of the town demand it.

Standard Puts New Oil On The Market

Many record lubricating performances are the result of the road test conducted by the Standard Oil Company (New Jersey) with the new "Standard" Motor Oil. These tests were made with stock cars and trucks of representative manufacturers, including Ford, Dodge, Mack, Buick, Hudson, White and other well known makes.

All the tests marked a striking advance in motor lubrication. With a Ford car, a run of 608 miles over a period of 28 days was made. The new "Standard" Motor Oil showed a substantial decrease in both oil and gasoline consumption, while the oil mileage increased 12.8 per cent and the gas mileage 12.3 per cent.

In addition, the driver of the Ford reported improved pulling, snappier pick-up, elimination of the drag which had previously shown on the hills,

and the removal of carbon which had been in the motor when the new oil was put in.

A Mack test was equally successful. During a working of 28 days, a big AC Mack truck, using the new oil, had 19.5 per cent increase in oil mileage and 20.9 percent in gas mileage. The motor was cooler, had less friction, and gave more power. Besides, the new oil cleaned out the existing carbon deposit and left none itself.

When a Buick car was examined before the tests, there were heavy carbon deposits on the cylinder heads and pistons. The new oil was then poured in the crank-case and the car ran 2,969 miles when it was again examined.

Most of the carbon had disappeared. The slight amount remaining was easily wiped off with a cloth.

Dodges, Hudsons, and Whites were among other cars which fared splendidly in the tests. In a 1,080 mile road test run, a Dodge touring, using the new oil had 49.3 per cent increase in oil mileage and 10 per cent increase in gas mileage. There was also much smoother operation of the motor, more power and less sauginess on the hills.

A Hudson went 992 miles in its test. The tabulated results furnished a 27.1 per cent increase in oil mileage and 12.4 per cent in gas mileage. The driver of the car reported decidedly smoother operation of the motor at all speeds, more power and less drag on the hills.

Economy was the keynote of the results of the stiff 2,947 mile road test given a 5-ton White truck. With the new oil in the crank-case, the White secured 19.5 per cent increase in oil mileage, and 13.8 per cent in gas mileage. Further tests on White motors resulted always in decided decrease in carbon deposit, less friction, cooler motors, smoother running at all speeds and better all-round lubrication.
