

# CHEROKEE FAIR TO BE BEST EVER THIS YEAR

(Continued from page 1)

Largest number of paid passengers through the gates on each of the first three days of the fair, is expected to help increase the number of paid admissions to the fair.

It is planned to keep the fair grounds open at night. The buildings will be so lighted that those attending at night may see all the exhibits except some of the livestock, which will not all be kept on the

grounds over night. The admission charges will be 25 cents during the day except for children under 12 years of age, who will be admitted free. At night adults and children will be charged 15 cents each.

Premium lists may be found at most of the stores in the county and at strategic points in the neighboring counties. The premium list follows:

RULES AND REGULATIONS		

**1. The Fair Grounds** will be open to the public on Wednesday October 13th, and closed to the public on Saturday, October 16th, 1926. Gate will open each day at 7:00 A. M. Exhibits to be removed on Saturday A. M.

**2. Competition open to Cherokee, Clay, Graham and Macon Counties.**

**3. Every animal and article on the grounds will be under the control of the Association, and while every precaution will be taken for the safe keeping of same, the Association will, in no way be responsible for any loss, damage or accident that may occur.**

**4. No animal will be allowed to run at large on the grounds, nor any hitching be allowed except at regular places allotted for that purpose.**

**5. Where general and special rules conflict the special rule shall apply.**

**6. The Superintendent or manager of the respective departments of the Fair will have supervision and control of the exhibit during the Fair.**

**7. Automobiles will be admitted to the grounds free at the owner's risk.**

**8. No person shall enter the arena to exhibit his own stock or any stock that he is interested in except as driver, rider, or groom. Any violation of this rule will forfeit right to premium.**

**9. Any person or persons exhibiting animals or articles, and to publicly express disapproval on the grounds, of the decision of judges, or who by act or interference shall be guilty or conduct becoming an exhibitor shall not be permitted to compete again for premiums at any fair of this association.**

**10. No premium will be awarded when but one animal or article is exhibited, unless such animal or article shall possess special merit and be considered well worthy of a premium.**

**11. No premiums will be paid to persons not attending the fair.**

**ENTRIES**

**12. All entries must be made and exhibits placed in their respective departments not later than 11:00 A. M. Wednesday, Oct., 13th, 1926, except in case of livestock. (See special rules.)**

**13. The Building and entry books will be open on Tuesday, Oct., 12th, and exhibitors are urged to enter everything possible on that date.**

**14. All entries must be made at the required time, and an entry card giving the exhibitors number, department and class number shall be securely fastened to each article, and then placed in the section provided by manager of the respective department.**

**15. No person except the judges on duty and the officers of the association will be allowed inside the arena grounds while the judging is in progress.**

**16. Any objection to a judge must be made in writing to the secretary or manager, the objection to be fully stated and signed by the person making objection.**

**17. In judging blooded stock, regard will be had to purity of blood established by pedigree, size, form, action and general characteristics of the various breeds, making allowance for age, condition, feeding and other circumstances.**

**18. Should any animal or article be exhibited which does not come up to the standard required of that class, or for any other reason, such as lack of condition, unsoundness, blemishes, poor breeding, the judges shall so declare, and the manager shall dismiss the animal from the ring, stating the reason therefor.**

**19. Judges will be required to make written reports of awards on blanks furnished by the secretary, and are requested to hand in their reports to the superintendent as soon as decisions are made.**

**PROTESTS**

**20. All protests must be made in writing to the secretary or the Superintendent of the respective departments, and must state fully and specifically upon what grounds the protest is made, and accompanied by a fee of \$1.00, otherwise it will not be considered. In case the protest is sustained the fee will be returned; otherwise to be the property of the association.**

**ARENA EXHIBITS OR SHOW RINGS**

**21. All animals exhibited in the arena must be controlled by halter.**

**22. As far as possible pen will be made for livestock but no charge will be made for same.**

**23. All officers of this association will be designated by a badge worn on their coat.**

**PREMIUMS**

**24. All premiums awarded will be designated by ribbons, tags or labels of the following colors:**

First prize—Blue.  
Second prize—Red.  
Sweepstake—Purple.

**CONCESSIONS**

**25. All privilege and concession people, together with their employees, assistants and helpers, must obey the rules or any other special**

rules of the association, and any refusal or neglect to do so will forfeit all rights that they may have held by virtue of such privilege or concessions.

**27. This association reserves the right to refund in whole or in part money paid by privilege and concessions people and refuse to allow any party or article or game to operate or do business should they become objectionable.**

**28. All property, fixtures, merchandise, etc., the property of privilege or concession people, will be taken in the grounds at their risk, and kept in such places as they themselves may provide, or agree to, and the association will not be responsible for any loss, damage, theft or failure to perform its part of the contract, should officers of the law seize, stop or prevent the party from doing business on the grounds of this association.**

**29. No fee will be charged for any entry or exhibit except commercial exhibits, of wares not produced in the County or manufactured in the County, and shown for advertising purposes for which space on the ground will be allowed for a small concession charge.**
