69 Counties in North Carolina Complete Tuberculosis Test

On September 1, the State Department of Agriculture had completed a test for tuberculosis on all cattle in sixty-nine counties of the State. Sixteen additional counties have made an appropriation for this work and active testing of the cattle in most of these counties is in progress. It will be seen that 85 of the 100 counties have taken up this work. This includes all except three counties in Eastern Carolina. On August 1, there were 210 counties in the United States that had completed this work and of this number North Carolina had 64.

A rather small percentage of the cattle tested have been found tuberculous, but these diseased animals have been slaughtered and the owners paid indemnity under an Act of the General Assembly. Practically all cities and towns of the State are receiving a milk supply from cows that have been tested and are known to be free from tuberculosis. This is important, say food experts, since it is a well known fact that animal tuberculosis is transmissible to people, especially children, and children are large consumers of milk. Animal tuberculosis is also of great economic importance since an animal affected with this disease cannot be profitable.

Inspectors of the State Department and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, cooperating, are now engaged in bringing this work to the attention of the citizens of the remaining 15 counties in the State that have not taken up the work. It is believed that it is only a matter of short time before they will take up the work and North Carolina will have 100 counties that have eradicated tuberculosis from its cattle.
