Mrs. Minnie Ensley spent Saturday night with her brother on Ivey Log in Georgia.

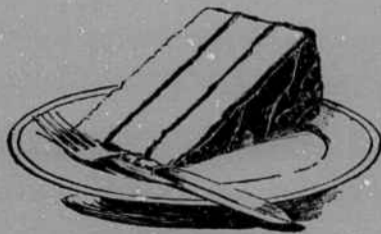
