INDEPENDENT VOTERS

The election of Tuesday, November 2nd, is evidence that the electorate is braving away from party lines in local affairs and exercising its own judgment at the polls and does not blindly follow the leader of any party.

Cherokee County, normally Republican by a large majority, elected a sheriff, clerk and coroner on the Democratic ticket, at the same time giving Mr. Smathers a majority.

Swain, another strong Republican County, elected Sheriff and Clerk of Court on Democratic ticket.

Jackson a Democratic stronghold elected every Republican on the county ticket, but at the same time gave Waver a good majority for Congress. Macon, another Democratic County elected a Republican Representative and a County Commissioner, at same time giving Mr. Weaver a good majority.

McDowell, still another Democratic County, elected the Republican ticket.

To say that the Democrats carried Cherokee and Swain, or that the Republicans carried Jackson and McDowell is a mistake. Cherokee and Swain are still Republican counties and Jackson and McDowell are still in the other column. It was the Republicans who elected the Democratic officers in Cherokee and Swain and it was the Democrats who elected the Republican officers in Jackson and McDowell.

If these officers are wise they will heed their lesson. The issues in all these counties were clear cut. If the officials heed the mandate of the people and deliver the goods the above conditions may continue for some time but if they fail to live up to the trust reposed in them by the voters two years hence they will all go out by a larger landslide than they went in.

The people pay for a moral and business administration of their county. They are entitled to it. The day has arrived in many counties and soon will in all when they are going to have it regardless of political lines.—The Clay County News.
