This Thrifty Home Brings Joy to the Rent-Weary



FOR THE family of four or five there is this attractive two-story, spacious home of beveled siding and slate or shingle roof.

One of the interesting features of this house is that every room has a double exposure, so that the living room has three sides exposed. Large windows not shown in the plan may at slight expense be added at either end of the living room.

The type of house offers the utmost in light and cross-ventilation, it would be well to protect it against the entrance of cold and heat by insulation with asbestos for the walls and roof. Such insulation will also cut down outside noise to a marked degree, as in addition to its insulating property, asbestos is an excellent sound absorber.

The living room has the much desired open fireplace and elegantly appointed bookshelves flanking the entrance to the dining room. The sun porch may be put either to the side or the back of the house, according to the builder's plan or to conform to the demands of the lot.

Honorable W. N. Everett, Secretary of State has accepted the appointment of State Seal Sale Chairman for the coming Tuberculosis Christmas Seal Sale which is conducted from Thanksgiving to a Christmas.

Mr. Everett says that he has for many years appreciated the seal sale and the cheering and wonderful work done by the state and national associations and he is glad to render any service possible in this noble cause.

The most outstanding and comprehensive piece of research work in tuberculosis is on the tubercle bacillus and is being done at this time by the National Tuberculosis Association. This is done in a cooperative way by using the best laboratories and scientific workers in the line connected with our leading universities and is financed by grants from the National Tuberculosis Association. At the same time they are securing the cooperation of the leading sanatoriums of America in clinical research which is a very necessary part of the program. The North Carolina Tuberculosis Sanatorium is included in this list. For years the North Carolina Tuberculosis Sanatorium has conducted clinical research and is also to join in this nation-wide movement. This clinical research not only proves or disproves new discoveries in laboratories or elsewhere but it assures the patients of more careful and thorough examinations and better treatment.

Among other things, the North Carolina Tuberculosis Association is doing a most important piece of work in health education. This being interpreted in concrete language means teaching the child proper health habits in order that he may remain healthy and training the undernourished child in nutrition classes in order that he may become so. In some class rooms, one hundred per cent of the children have reached a normal state of nutrition while in a school of five hundred, ninety-six per cent were successful. It is felt that the proper nutrition of our children is the most important thing before our people.

The many friends of Mr. Everett throughout the state and elsewhere will be delighted to know that his health is greatly improved and that he is that regaining his old-time vigor so much so that he feels able to take up this philanthropic work for the North Carolina Tuberculosis Association.

MUMPS

Mumps is another one of the contagious diseases which cause children and, some times, older people a great deal of trouble but relatively seldom causes death.

Just below the lobe of the ear at the angle of the jaw on each side is a small gland, the parotid gland. It is the largest of the salivary glands and empties its contribution of saliva to the mouth by way of a small tube called Stenson's duct.

For some reason the virus which is the organism causing mumps, chooses this parotid gland as the site for its greatest activity just as the pneumococcus chooses the lungs and the diphtheria bacillus chooses the upper respiratory tract. The toxins eliminated by the mumps virus, however, just like the toxins of other infections are absorbed by the blood and lymph and circulated throughout the entire system causing general systemic symptoms.

After the infection enters the system, when the individual is exposed, there is a period of ten to twenty days, usually about fourteen days, before there are any symptoms, then there is a period of one or two days when the patient feels more or less ill before the typical swelling of the gland is noticed. Most often, however, there is nothing more than an apparent slight cold and mumps is not considered until the child complains first of a pain in the jaw, usually while eating or the swelling is noticed. The gland continues to swell for three or four days, remains stationary for one or two days and usually completely disappears in ten days or less time.

Other salivary glands, especially the submaxillary, are sometimes involved and occasionally there is involvement of the reproductive glands, the testicles, ovaries and breasts.

To avoid complications, it is very essential that persons remain quiet either in bed or at least very carefully protected and quiet in the house. This is sometimes difficult in the case of children who are not feeling seriously ill.

Mumps most frequently occurs in the pre-adolescent age, that is, between the ages of eight to fourteen. The infection is seldom transmitted by clothing or by a third person.

After the Bridge Game



THE light repast served after the informal evening bridge game should consist of the most attractive and tasty dishes that the hostess can prepare with the least time and effort. The casual touch is lost if she appears to be at too much trouble to prepare the refreshments.

Canned foods offer a wonderful source of dainty dishes that can be prepared at a moment's notice. All the preliminaries are done and there is little more than the serving to occupy the attention of the hostess.

Creamed dishes offer good variety from the so-called served coffee and cake. For these one may buy canned crabmeat, lobster, chicken, shrimp, mushrooms. The can may be opened, the toast made before the guests arrive, and the dishes and cups laid out on the tray as well as the bowl to hold the steaming concoction. When the hostess

excuses herself, she has only to light the fire under the coffee and prepare the white sauce. In this, heat the shrimp, chicken, mushrooms, or whatever else you may be using, and put in covered dish.

Canned cheese is worthy of a place on a reserve shelf, since it is very acceptable for late evening refreshments. Cream cheese with strawberry, raspberry, or currant jam is excellent.

For the warmer months, fruit salad with a whipped cream sauce would be well received. Jellied tomato salad and jellied chicken are also good.

Canned fruit salad is good, and canned fruits offer opportunities for delicious pinches. The juice from the canned fruits used for salads can be utilized for punch as follows:

To the juice of six oranges, add a cupful each of the juice of a can of peaches and pineapple. Chill in ice-box until ready to serve, add a quart of ice water.
