"When arriving at United States customs notify the officials, who will issue a clearance slip, which is given talk. to all motorists intending to remain in Canada for a period of days or who intend leaving at another port.

"You will find the United States custom house located at the boundary of the United States and the domin ion. Principal stations are at Rouses Point, New York; Detroit, Mich; Calias, Me.; Holton, Me.; Jackman, Me., and in the far west. United States principal border towns.

"Upon arriving at the Canadian customs, present your certificate of registration and you will immediately receive a 30-day touring permit without having to file a bond. This permit is later surrendered to the Canadian customs at whatever port of exit you leave Canada.

It was the concensus of opinion that the hardsurface should be concrete, and steps will be taken to secure figures on the amount of traffie and tonnage passing over this road into and from Murphy at three different points.

It was brought out at the meeting that it was the intention or plans of the State Highway Department to put down a water bound macadam top on the road from Hayesville to John E.
