NEW CHEVROLET OUT JANUARY 1

Promises to Be Most Spectacular Low Priced Car of All Time

Promising the most spectacular low priced automobile at all time, the Chevrolet Motor Company announced that a complete new line of motor cars will be introduced to the public January first.

In confirming reports that Chevrolet would very shortly introduce a new car of surpassing interest, W. S. Knudsen, president of the Chevrolet Motor Company, declared that the official announcement covering all details of Chevrolet's sensational new product would come Sunday January first. No details will be available until that time, he said.

Chevrolet assembly plants have been in production on the new car since December 12. Factories in Flint, Mich., Tarrytown, N. Y., St. Louis, Mo., Oakland, Cal., Buffalo, N. Y., Janesville, Wis., and Norwood, O., have been humming with activity preparing for the highways the first of the new cars that promise to make motor car history in 1928.

Shipments of the new cars to dealers have been leaving the various assembly plants since December 15 so that the vast country-wide dealer organization may be prepared for the introductory showing next Sunday. (Continued on page 2)

RALEIGH BANK MAKING LOANS TO FARMERS

In a letter received this week, placing an advertisement in The Scout, the Atlantic Joint Stock Land Bank of Raleigh, has this to say with reference to farm loans:

"Credits through the Farm Loan System, by necessity, have been greatly restricted during this year on account of the depressed condition bonds. A great many of the Land existing in the market on farm loan Banking institutions have been compelled to withdraw almost entirely from the market. We ourselves, have never restricted our correspondents in the matter of applications, although we have not, during the past few months, made any concerted effort to reach new applicants.

"As we have been fortunate recently in being able to find an acceptable market for our bonds, we feel justified in assuring the farmers of our territory of our ability to take care of their requirements in our line. This same situation is not applicable to Land Banks, generally."
