Arthur Hugh Beal, 20 years old, member of one of Cherokee County's oldest and most prominent families, died at a sanitarium in Akron, Ohio, last Friday, June 8th, and the body was brought to Murphy for burial and interment.

Arthur had been sick for about two weeks, but his family did not know it until four days before he died. He died of flu and double pneumonia. He had been in Akron for about eighteen months working in the Goodyear factory there.

He stated that within a few years travel by air would be as common as automobiles today, and the town that did not have a landing field would be greatly handicapped, and considered a back number. While it is perhaps not yet ripe and too far advanced for such a step, it was his opin-ion that it might be expedient to give the matter serious considera-
