Elect and Instruct Delegates to State Convention—Adopt Resolutions of Respect for Hon. G. B. Walker

The Democrats of Cherokee County met in convention at Murphy last Saturday morning at 11 o'clock and elected delegates to the State Convention which met in Raleigh on Tuesday of this week and elected delegates to the National Convention at Houston, Texas.

The meeting was opened by Chairman C. B. Hill, of the county executive committee. E. B. Norvell was elected as secretary. Later Mr. Hill was elected as Chairman of the Democratic County executive committee for another two years, and C. B. Maloney was elected as secretary.

ARTHUR BEAL LAID TO REST HERE SUNDAY

Murphy Boy, Who Died in Akron, Ohio, Last Week, Was Member of Prominent Family

Arthur Hugh Beal, 20 years old, member of one of Cherokee County's oldest and most prominent families, died at a sanitarium in Akron, Ohio, last Friday, June 8th, and the body was brought to Murphy for burial and interment.

Arthur had been sick for about two weeks, but his family did not know it until four days before he died. He died of flu and double pneumonia. He had been in Akron for about eighteen months working in the Goodyear factory there.

The body arrived Saturday night, his brother and wife, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Beal, meeting it at Etowah, Tenn.

Funeral services were held from the family residence in Bealtown Sunday afternoon at 2:30 by Rev. T. L. Sasser, and interment was in the family burial ground on a knole just to the rear of the home in which he was born and reared.

He is survived by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Beal, four brothers and three sisters: W. P. and Charlie Beal, of Murphy; R. T. Beal, of Hayesville, and O. F. Beal, of Asheville; Mrs. Fred L. Scroggs, of Brasstown; Mrs. George Stalcup, and Mrs. B. B. Cornwell, of Murphy.

FAIN IS NAMED HEAD OF LIONS FOR THIRD TIME

Officers Elected at Meeting Tuesday Night—Other Important Matters Taken Up

W. M. Fain was elected president of the Lions Club at their regular meeting Tuesday night for the third consecutive time, and the other officers named were: Dr. Edw. E. Adams, first vice president; C. W. Bailey, second vice president; Harry P. Cooper, secretary; W. W. Hyde, treasurer; C. K. Hoover, Lion Tamer; T. L. Sasser, Tail Twister; and E. P. Hawkins, G. H. Cop and E. C. Moore were named as directors.

Lion Cooper suggested that the Lions get behind a movement to have the Southern Railway and L. & N. Railway have a pullman car run from Asheville to Atlanta and return via Murphy. He stated that he had been in touch with persons close to the railroad executives and it was their opinion that Murphy could get the pulman service by going after it. Mr. Cooper also said, during the course of his remarks, that it might be a wise thing for Murphy to begin to look around for an air port, or landing field. He stated that within a few years travel by air would be as common as automobiles today, and the town that did not have a landing field would be greatly handicapped, and considered a back number. While it is perhaps not yet ripe and too far advanced for such a step, it was his opinion that it might be expedient to give the matter serious consideration.

Lion Gray gave a report on the Club's registered Guernsey bull, which was purchased last fall. He stated that he was now ready for service and had been placed in the Peachtree community with Mr. F. J. Watkins, and arrangements had been made for a service charge of \$1.50. The Lions purchased this registered animal last fall in order to help the dairy program of the county and the movement for better dairy cows.

Lions E. P. Hawkins, Harve Elkins and W. M. Fain went to the State Lions Convention at Statesville Thursday and Friday as delegates from Murphy.

Lion Fain, in accepting the presidency of the Club for the third time, expressed his appreciation of the confidence the club had expressed in his leadership, and stated that he could say, without boasting or any fear of contradiction, that he had had the best co-operation from the Murphy Lions in doing things than any other club in the state, and he was proud of the record the Murphy Club had made in the past.

Body Carried to Mt. Pleasant For Funeral and Interment

Mrs. Mary Cooper Barrier, 77 years old, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. M. Axley, in East Murphy on Friday, June 1st, about 5 o'clock in the afternoon. Mrs. Barrier's home was in Spokane, Wash., but she had been visiting her daughter some time. She was sick only about two weeks.

She was born in Virginia and later moved to North Carolina, and still later going to Spokane, Wash. She lived to a ripe old age, and saw her children occupying places of leadership in the business and social affairs of the country. She had been a member of Mt. Pleasant Methodist church for more than fifty years, and it was fitting that her body should be carried back to rest in the churchyard where she met her Master.

Funeral services were conducted at the home of a relative, Mr. Dan Barrier, of Mt. Pleasant, N. C., Monday, June 4th, by the pastor of Mt. Pleasant church, Rev. Wolf, assisted by Rev. J. C. Fisher, and interment was in the churchyard.

MAD DOG IS KILLED BY POLICEMAN

City Fathers Pass Ordinance Making It a Misdemeanor To Allow Dogs to Run At Large

Last week officer Neil Sneed was called on to kill a dog said to have been mad, and from all actions the dog was afflicted with rabies, and the city council passed the following ordinance at its meeting Tuesday night:

WHEREAS, it has been brought to the attention of the Board of Aldermen that a mad dog was recently killed in the Town of Murphy, and that other dogs have been bitten by mad dogs and are running at large in Murphy and vicinity, thereby endangering the health of the community, and constituting a public nuisance.

THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Murphy that it shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of any dog to permit or allow the same to run at large within the corporate limits of the Town of Murphy between the dates of June 1st and October 15th.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction, shall be fined not less than \$5.00 and not more than twenty-five dollars.

This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage.

Passed this the 12th day of June, 1928.
