## Poultry is producing Big Profits in the Southland

In that part of the Central South from  
 the Ohio River to the Gulf served by

 business. Their work has been direct-  
 ly with the families of farmers and  
 with farm organizations; they have  
 steadily pointed out the value of high-  
 grade poultry of distinct breeds and  
 of the production and shipment of high-  
 quality eggs; they have pointed out the  
 value of proper feeding and of sanitary  
 houses and surroundings for the flock;  
 helped in solving the problems of com-  
 bating disease and of weeding out un-  
 desirable members of the flock; and  
 have given their advice and assistance  
 as to shipping and marketing in car-  
 load movements.
