A Commercial Cannery operating plants in Virginia, Tennes-see, North Carolina and Florida is ready to establish one in Cherokee County and hux something like forty thousand dollars worth of beans and tomatoes from the farmers of this section. All the company is asking the farmers to do is to agree to grow one hun-dred acres of beans and three hundred acres of tomatoes.

Farmers in and near Franklin and in East Tennessee, make from eight to two hundred dollars per acre growing these crops and selling them to the canneries at those places. What they do, the farmers of this section can do. Here are some reasons why the farmers of this and adjoining ties should take advantage of this opportunity:
