40,000 FOR THE FARMERS

A Commercial Cannery operating plants in Virginia, Tennessee, North Carolina and Florida is ready to establish one in Cherokee County and buy something like forty thousand dollars worth of beans and tomatoes from the farmers of this section.

Farmers in and near Franklin and in East Tennessee, make from eight to two hundred dollars per acre growing these crops and selling them to the canneries at those places.

First: From three to five times as much per acre can be made in growing these crops as in growing corn and like crops.

Second: These crops would bring in cash in the early and middle part of the summer when the farmer has little else to sell, and would provide an income at this season of the year.

Third: It would take little if any more effort to grow these crops than it does to grow corn.

Fourth: Next year, when the cannery has proven itself, there will be more people wanting to grow crops for it than the cannery can handle.

Democrats Trail G. O. P. In County Ticket Tues.

publicans being given close races for other offices, that of Representative in the General Assembly going to the Republicans by 41 votes.

The county officers all Republicans, in Tuesday's election are as follows: Representative, E. P. Hawkins; Sheriff, N. W. Abernathy; Register of Deeds (reelected) W. A. Boyd; County Commissioners, J. W. S. Davis, T. D. Hickey, and W. J. Martin (re-elected); Coroner, Dr. S. C. Heighway; Surveyor, W. A. Adams, (re-elected.)

A tabulation of the voting in Cherokee County gave Herbert Hoover, Republican candidate for President, the largest popular vote, and his largest single majority. Hoover's vote was 3,253, and Alfred E. Smith, Democratic candidate for President, received 1,911 votes. Hoover's majority being 1,342.

In the race for county officers, E. M. Birchfield, candidate for reelection for Sheriff, received the largest vote among the Democrats, but was defeated by 134 votes by N. W. Abernathy, Republican. Abernathy's vote was 2,702 and Birchfield's was 2,568. George Leatherwood, Democratic candidate for Surveyor, received the lowest vote among the Democrats, while his opponent, W. A. Adams, received the largest single majority among the Republican candidates for county officers. Leatherwood received 1,325 votes, while Adams received

1,913, the latter's majority being 1,183.

A study of the tabulation of the voting in Cherokee County, taking the race for governor as a barometer, places the Republican voting strength for the county at 3,053, and the Democratic strength at 2,149, giving the Republicans a majority of 909. The results of the governor's race most nearly reveals the voting strength of the two parties in the county because of the absence of any split in either party on this particular ticket, while issues of the other races brought out the full voting strength of the county.

According to these calculations, a further study of the table shows that 375 Republicans voted for a Democratic Sheriff, and 433 Democrats voted for a Republican candidate for President.
