NOTICE OF SPECIAL SCHOOL TAX ELECTION

At a regular meeting of the board of commissioners of Cherokee county, North Carolina on the 5th day of January, 1931, a petition was presented to the said board signed by more than one third of the qualified voters of a certain boundary described and set out asking that an election be called by the said board for the purpose of voting for or against a special school tax of not more than thirty cents on the one hundred dollars worth of property and ninety (90) cents on each taxable poll in said boundary to supplement the Public School fund which may be apportioned to said district by the county Board of Education.

Therefore it is ordered by the board of county commissioners of Cherokee county in regular session on the first Monday, the 5th day of January, 1931, that an election be held under the laws and regulations of the General election laws of the State of North Carolina to be held at the regular voting place in School District No. 2, Notla Township hereinafter set out.

Said election to be held on Tuesday, the 24th day of March, 1931, to vote, on written or printed ballots, for or against Special School Tax in the following territory to-wit:

It being that boundary known as District No. 2 in Notla Township, and described as follows:

Beginning at the Miles Green place, going up the branch to the dividing ridge, Notla Township line, thence with that ridge through by Letitia Post Office, thence a westerly direction with the Shoal Creek and Notla Township line to the Anderson branch, thence down the branch, thence to the Allen Dickey place, thence with the branch to the Notla River crossing the river at the mouth of said branch to the east bank of said river, thence up Notla River to the mouth of Gold Branch thence up said branch to its head waters, crossing the ridge at the old Bellview Road and an easterly direction to the branch below the Suit Place, thence with the Brass-town Road a westerly direction to No. 28 at Tom Evans place, thence crossing No. 28 and running up a ridge a north westerly direction to the top of the mountain, thence straight to Notla River, crossing said river to the West bank thence down Notla River to the beginning.

ANDREWS BRIEFS

At their regular meeting January 17, the Cherokee chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy went on record as favoring the payment of pensions to Confederate veterans monthly instead of semi-annually as at present. The chapter passed a resolution memorializing the members of the Legislature at Raleigh to work to this end.

It was pointed out in discussing the resolution that the pension is the only source of income for many of the veterans and widows of veterans, and that six-month intervals between the pension payments often works a real hardship on them. The cooperation of other chapters will be solicited in bringing this matter to the attention of the legislators.

The meeting Saturday was held at the home of the Misses Kate and Leila Hayes near Tomotla. The Misses Hayes had as joint hostess their aunt, Mrs. Nan Fulmer. Mrs. Giles Cover, president of the chapter presided. Among the business matters to receive the attention was the report of the committee in charge of placing markers upon the unmarked graves of soldiers and veterans. It was reported that applications had been made for more than fifty markers.

After the business session Rev. R. V. Prevost of Andrews made a talk on "Lee, the Christian Gentleman". The hostesses served a delicious salad course as refreshments. As a conclusion to the program Mrs. Fulmer recited "The first Battle of Manassas" to the great delight of all.

The Andrews Woman's Club held its regular monthly meeting in the club room at the school building on Tuesday afternoon, January 13. On account of the fact that the president, Mrs. D. H. Tillitt was on the program Mrs. Giles Cover presided. Mrs. Rose Perron and Mrs. Roy DeLong were received as new members.

The business session was occupied chiefly with reports and discussion of the work the club is doing in serving school lunches. Over two hundred free lunches were reported served during December. Plans were made for enlarging this feature of the club service in account of the many appeals that are coming in for help.

Mrs. E. F. Troutman gave an interesting and comprehensive review of current events and Mrs. D. H. Tillitt gave an introduction to the book, "Daughters of Eve" by Bradford. The club is reading this book and Mrs. Tillitt add much to the interest of the readers by her helpful and entertaining introduction.

The use of scientific methods plus a generous supply of preservative and faith is bringing success in the poultry business to Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Wood of Andrews. These people are demonstrating very forcefully how poultry can be made to contribute handsomely to the family budget.

Since there was only an ordinary-size town lot available at the back of their home. But by careful planning and utilization of their space they have been able to take care of a rather phenomenal growth in their business.

Believing that the best is none too good to insure success they have not practised a false economy in the purchase of cheap equipment and stock. Their flock of one hundred fifty White Leghorn hens comes from the very best strains in the country and each individual in the flock is selected for production.

Their hatchery is equipped with a late model Jamesway incubator of 2160 egg capacity and brooder facilities are adequate to care for the output. From the hatchery last year 500 baby chicks were sold to customers in Cherokee county. As yet it has not been necessary to go out of the county in search of customers. In the two years of its operation the hatchery has paid for its equipment. Custom hatching has proved to be a profitable feature and will continue to be carried on.

Not having had any special poultry experience or training Mr. and Mrs. Wood turned to County Agent Gray for instruction and guidance. According to Mrs. Wood's statement they have followed these instructions diligently.

They believe in utilizing all the help that is available.

Among the factors that are contributing most to their success with poultry they believe to be the extreme care exercised in selecting eggs for hatching; close attention to sanitation; and the merciless culling and grading of their flock. Of course Mr. and Mrs. Wood are firm advocates of cooperative marketing among all poultry producers.

Interest in boy Scout work is growing in Andrews at this time. A troop has been organized under the auspices of the Intermediate department of the Methodist Sunday school with Rev. Walter J. Miller as Scout Master and Walter Allen as assistant. The Troop committee is composed of J. H. Christy, C. W. E. Pittman, and Frank Swann.
