BOB REYNOLDS TO SPEAK AT MURPHY JULY 1

County Organization Formed For For Asheville Man In Senate Race Run-Over

An enthusiastic meeting of supporters of Robert R. Reynolds, candidate for the United States Senate, was held in Murphy Wednesday morning at which Wythe M. Peyton, western manager, was present, and an organization of a Reynolds Club for Cherokee county formed. It was announced at the meeting

that Mr. Reynolds will speak in Murohy on Friday night, July 1st, at 7:15 Central Time, at the court house. Mr. Reynolds will leave Asheville with a motor tour composed of about twenty-five cars flyng Reynolds banners and led by a ruck with a brass band and the State police patrol, stopping enroute for short talks at Canton, Waynes-ville, Hazelwood, Sylva, Dillsboro, Bryson City and Andrews. He will arrive in Murphy in time to speak that night. Before the speaking, the band is expected to give a concert in the public square at Murphy.

Harry P. Cooper, who has been appointed campaign manager for Mr. Reynolds in Cherokee county, predicted that the court house will not hold the people who will come to Murphy to hear "Our Bob," as Mr. Reynolds is known in western North Carolina, and that this will be one of the greatest political rallies ever held in this part of the state. Numcrous people from the surrounding counties who desire to hear Mr. Roynolds have already sent word that a large crowd from those countics will be present.

"All indications in Cherokee county are that Mr. Reynolds will receive the largest vote ever accorded a candidate for public office in the county," Mr. Cooper said.
