The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations as follows:

Architects and architectural engineers, various grades, \$2,600 to \$5,600 a year. Forest Service Department of Agriculture; Treasury Department; and Veterans' Administration.

Taxation, economists various grades, \$2,600 to \$4,600 a year. Forest Service, Department of Agriculture.

All States except Massachusetts, Utah, Iowa, Vermont, Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia have received less than their quota of appointments in the apportioned departmental service in Washington, D. C.

MURPHY TAKES OPENER, 17-13, FROM ISABELLA

Both Teams Show Good Pre-Season Form On Local Park Sunday

The Murphy baseball team opened the 1935 season in the ball park here Sunday with a slug fest that round the local boys on the long end of an 18 to 13 score over Isabella.

A large group of people from this section saw the Murphy team collect 19 hits off Sisson, the the Isabella pitcher, and the Tennesseans find three Murphy hurlers for 13 hits.

Though plainly rough in spots the Murphy team worked well considering the bad condition of the field and the playing of the first game without much practice.

Charles Henderson was the batting star of the game making three hits out of five times at bat, and driving a long fly to deep center field in the fifth inning for a home run. Townson got three hits out of three official times at bat and Barton and George Leatherwood each got three hits out of five trips to the plate.

Jones was the big sticks man for Isabella making four hits and two runs out of five times at bat and W. Sisson made four hits out of six times at bat while L. Sisson faced the Murphy pitchers six times and collected four hits.

C. N. Hill, young Murphy slow ball hurler, started on the mound for Murphy and gave up eight hits with 10 strike outs to his credit. Max Sneed and Frank Hensley finished the game from the pitcher's box and did some nice throwing.

Murphy scored six runs in the first inning when the team batted around; picked up three more in the third, one in the fourth, five in the fifth and two in the seventh. Murphy did not go to bat in the ninth.

After scoring one run in the first inning, Isabella found the Murphy moundsmen for four runs in the fifth and three more in the sixth. They found three more in the eighth and two in the ninth and final inning which left them four runs behind.

Both teams played a good game of ball considering that it was the first game of the season and the crowd seemed to enjoy the spirit the teams showed on the field.

Manager Henry Hickman expressed his appreciation at the many people that turned out and the support given the team.

Mr. Cliff Passon—And Murphy—Crash News

Murphy, through the more particular medium of one of its own sons, Cliff Passon, has at last crashed the news in the western part of the state it was learned when a copy of the column "Life's Bright Side", written by the Roving Reporter, of the Forest City Courier, was received here this week.

In a good old two-column booster for the long arm of the law, the reporter built his story around the colorful Cliff, who went from poverty to riches back to poverty again and then to Raleigh where he became a highway patrolman.

Following are excerpts of the writer's column of Cliff: "Personally I believe, I am confident that all fair-thinking, broadminded, sincere, persons will readily agree with my conclusion that Forest City and Rutherford county are very fortunate indeed to have a state highway patrolman of the high calibre of Mr. Cliff Passon, the new officer recently assigned to duty in this part of Western North Carolina.

So, knowing Cliff as we all do, it is with great pleasure that we join in with Mr. R. Reporters final, enthusiastic send-off: "Viva! Bravo! Cliff Passon: may your gallant crusade for better law enforcement meet with hearty and encouraging success.
