Messrs. Will Forrester and Charlie Cavenger and little son Charles were Sunday afternoon visitors of the former's brother, Mr. Jule Forrester.

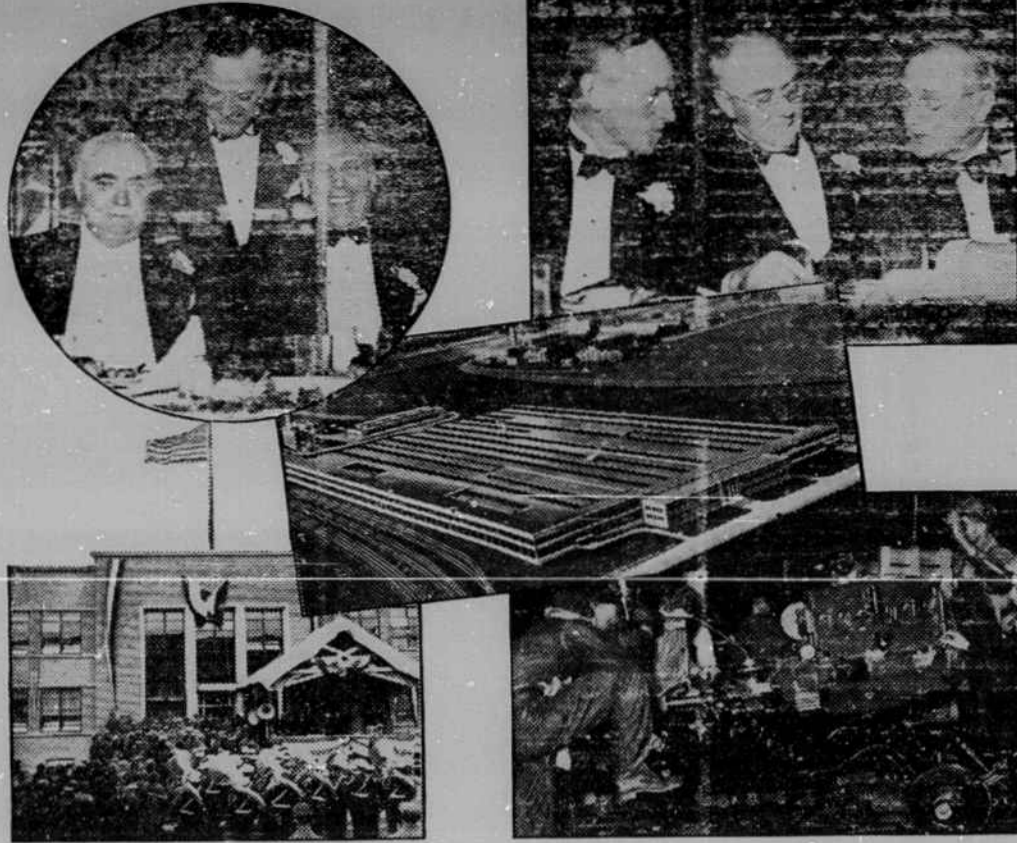
Mrs. C. A. Voyles and little son, Charles, were Sunday dinner guests of Mrs. O. A. Mashburn.

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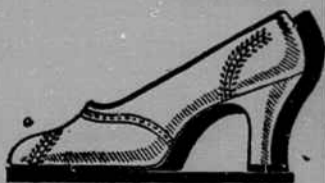
