SOUTHERN RAILWAY SYSTEM

NOTICE TO ALL TAX PAYERS

The General Assembly has abated all penalties and interest on tax sale certificates for the year 1932 and prior thereto, only upon condition that the taxes be paid on or before September 1st. After that day the release does not apply but penalties and interest must be added. I earnestly request all persons who owe taxes to take advantage of this act. Suits to foreclose taxes will necessarily have to be brought before that date, and this will mean costs in addition, but no suits will be started until August 1st. After that date actions will be instituted as fast as it is possible to do so. I am giving this notice so that all persons will have an opportunity to save themselves costs, penalties and interest.
