The contracts with the municipalities (to supply power) are subservient to the law of Alabama no less than if the municipalities had made contracts with a private wholesaler.

"The State of Alabama has exercised its regulatory powers in the instant case by authorizing the municipalities to enter into contracts with the Authority under certain stated conditions.

On Monday the court hears arguments on a petition by eight Louisiana Rice Millers against paying AAA processing taxes. The TVA arguments will conclude those on New Deal legislation except for one case involving the right of the government to condemn land in Louisville for a slum clearance project.

Which Church Do You Belong To, Gene?

An eminent New Dealer and his fiery tongued critic were at Loggerheads tonight over the asserted "Godlessness" of the Tennessee Valley Authority's model town of Norris.

TVA Chairman Arthur E. Morgan said it is not a "Godless town," but Governor Eugene Talmadge of Georgia replied that "it will be" soon if "they don't hurry and get some churches up there."

There is one church in the little East Tennessee community of 1,700 persons. It is non-denominational. The town was planned and established by the TVA near the site of Norris dam.

To Governor Talmadge, foe of the TVA, the presence of only one

church meant the TVA "has copied communism" so that it is "refusing to permit denominational churches to be built at Norris."

Dr. Morgan first took cognizance of charges of "Godlessness" in a speech here last night.

"You have heard, no doubt, that the town of Norris is a Godless town," he said. "Anyone who lives there knows that the rumor originated in Chicago and it just isn't true."

Out lashed Governor Talmadge in Atlanta today "I didn't say that Norris is Godless. But it will be Godless pretty quick if they don't hurry and get some churches up there."

Morgan said Norris residents "have repeatedly voted to have one religious organization rather than break up into the many various denominations."

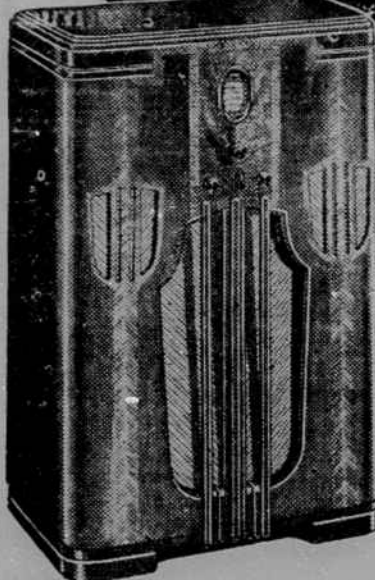
