TVA Asks For Appropriation For Fontana Dam

DEMOCRATS TO HOLD SERIES OF **COUNTY MEETS**

Will Select Representatives, Officers Of Organization

A number of Democrats meetings in Cherokee county have been arranged and announced by Dr. J. N. Hill, chairman of the Cherokee County Democratic executive committee.

Precinct meetings will be held at the precinct polling places through-out the county on Saturday, May 9, at 2 p. m., or at a place to be de-

at 2 p. m., or at a place to be designated later.

The general county convention will be held at the court house in Murphy, at 11 o'clock in the morning on Saturday, May 16.

The state convention has been scheduled for Raleigh at noon on

Friday, June 12. In lieu of a county primary this year Dr. Hill has announced that a "get together" Democratic rally will be held at the court house in Murphy at 2 p. m. Saturday April 18. At this meeting selections will be made for the different county offi-ces, Dr. Hill stated.

At the precinct meetings a committee of five Democrats, of whom one must be a woman, shall be selected and they will then elect a pre-cinct chairman and vice-chairman, one of whom must be a woman. These provisions were made accord-

ing to a recent amendment.
The chairman of these committees will then meet at the court house in Murphy Saturday morning, May 16, at 11 o'clock and elect a chairman and a vice-chair-man of the county executive com-mittee. The vice chairman must be a woman, the rules stipulate.

No controats between formers and the government are involved in the plan, but it will affect most of the farmers in Cherokee county in-stead of only about 10 as was the case with the AAA contract program.

The amount of benefits to be re-ceived will be only about half as much per farmer as was received by the 10 under AAA ce

Smaller benefits to more farmers plied with the regulations. A set-up will result from the new federal soil of state, county and community comconservation farm bounty plan in mittees will be formed to administer the plan.

Typical Farm To Get \$4 to \$10 Under the plan, the farmers re-ceive cash benefits for reducing their acreage in soil-depleting corps and turning the same areas into soil-building corps. The benefit payment on a typical 63-acre farm in the wes-tern part of North Carolina would be four to ten dollars, Mr. Ketner said.

Tobacco growers can obtain from the government under the plan five cents per pound for the normal yield of burley on land converted into soil improvements crops. The benefit payment cannot be made on an excess of 30 per cent of the base acreage for the particular farm. The base acreage for depleting crops shall be the acreage of such crops harvested in 1935, subject to certain provisions (Continued on back page)

FIVE TIMES SALES TAX COLLECTIONS

In a surprise move Monday, the Tennessee Valley Authority was un-derstood to have recommended the building a \$29,000,000 dam at Fon-tana in Swain county on the Little Tennessee river before construction

of the Fowler's Bend dam.
Dr. Arthur E. Morgan, chairman of the TVA board of directors, was said to have been holding secret hearings with the house appropria-tion committee last week and that negotiations had been started for acquisition of the property at the Fon-tana site which is owned by the Aluminum Company of America, a Mellon interest.

Although the content of Dr. Morgan's hearings has not been divulged it is apparent that the TVA is now working in favor of the Fontana project and if the land could be secured the Fontana project would begin first. Although \$1,000,000 has already

been appropriated for the Fowler's Bend dam it is understood that the TVA is having trouble in acquiring the land.

Both dams are expected to be built eventually, but the recommendation of the TVA, if carried out, would mean construction of the Fontana dam ahead of the Fowler Bend pro-

The Fontana site is 35 miles down the river from Bryson City near the North Carolina-Tennessee line.
