

Poultry Feed and Egg Prices Are Advancing

The expected rise in poultry feed prices will increase the necessity for good flock management according to Roy S. Dearyne, head of the State College poultry department.

He urges growers to check over their plants to see whether they are overcrowding their laying houses. There should be four square feet of floor space for each bird.

"If you have more birds than you can house adequately," he said, "sell out the inferior ones and sell them at once, as overcrowding will vitiate the chickens, check egg production, and may lead to disease.

"Be sure to have enough nests, feeders and waterers to keep the flock well supplied, as this will help keep egg production at a high level.

"You cannot afford to give expensive feed to birds that are not paying their own way. Cull out those which are questionable.

"Don't try to save money with cheap substitutes or by cutting down on the amount of the ration. This will cut down egg production and impair the health of the birds.

"Remember, egg prices will probably go up, and you want to produce as many as you can.

"It is feed that makes the egg and maintains the body. If you cannot feed them properly, dispose of them at once. You can't make money with a half-fed poultry flock."

Dearyne also urges poultrymen to develop their egg markets particularly local markets.

By grading their eggs carefully, he pointed out, they can build up a reputation and secure premium prices for their best eggs.

Crawls Into Boiler To Sleep; Found Dead

Chattanooga, Tenn., Aug. 27.—Hubert Wright, 19, finished his work at a boiler plant Saturday and sought a cool place to rest. He selected a boiler prepared for an oil company and went to sleep. A short time later he was found dead from the heat of a furnace.

Unaware of his presence in the boiler, mechanics had fixed it with a crane into an annealing furnace apparently without awaking him.

He was discovered by a workman making an inspection trip. The burners were shut off, but Wright was dead when his body was removed. Plant officials said the youth had crawled out of the boiler, but apparently was too confused to reach the furnace door.

WORTH MILLION TWO CONTRACTS SIGNED BY TVA

Two contracts, totalling over one million dollars, were here awarded by the Tennessee Valley Authority for equipment to be used in its electric power plant at the Norris Dam.

Allis Chalmers Manufacturing Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, will furnish two vertical shaft 48-cylinder turbines.

The Norris Dam power plant This equipment is valued at \$937,000.

The Aluminum Company of America, Pittsburgh, Pa., has contracted to furnish about 612 miles of electrical conductors for use in the Authority's rural electrification work. This work with its auxiliary equipment is valued at approximately \$182,000.

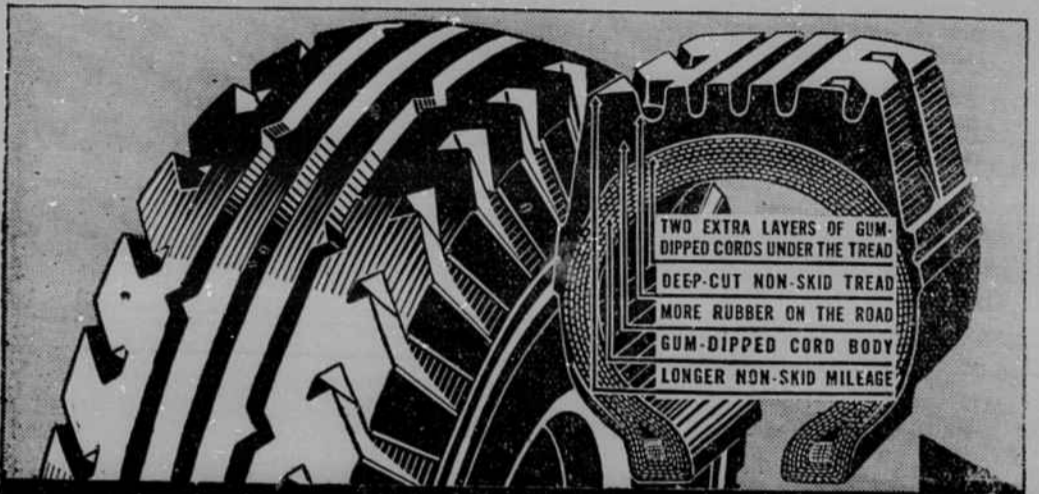
