BODY OF CCC BOY DROWNED IN LAKE CLAIMED TUESDAY

The body of Wayne Ammons, 26, CCC enrollee in the camp at Lake Santeetlah who was drowned there Sunday while riding in a canoe with three other boys, was claimed by his brother who resides in Atlanta, Ga., this week and burial was made.

After the boy who could not swim, had drowned, his body was conveyed to the funeral home of W. T. Forsyth at Andrews, where it was held while a check was being made of Asheville hospitals where the youth's mother was either supposed to be confined or working.

Failing to find the mother, the boy's brother arrived at Andrews and took charge of the body.

At his request it was brought out that the boy was accidentally drowned and that he was in the canoe without the consent of officials.

Honeymoon Ruined For Couple By Jinx

Saugus, Mass., Sept. 3.—A grim jinx cast suicide, rifle and revolver into the path of a young bride and bridegroom Saturday and ruined their honeymoon.

First came the death of an usher, and then the death of a bridegroom with pneumonia. The bridegroom went through hospital to the ceremony with a broken collar bone and as Mr. and Mrs. Jinx left for New Orleans in a motor car, a rainstorm came and they lost their car and were stranded.

Ill luck began to do its worst when an usher, Arthur C. Bink, 24, did not appear for a wedding rehearsal. Bink was found by the bridegroom lying dead Saturday on the kitchen floor of his home, the gas jets on.

Medical Examiner Lawrence F. Curick said he had committed suicide. Relatives and the young Melrose High school teacher had been studying hard at Harvard summer school.
