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## LARGE CROWD IS EXPECTED TO BE PRESENT

#### Thousands of Exhibits Are Being Planned; **Big Show Coming**

Tuesday the Eleventh Annual Cherokee County Fair—the master exposition of this section-will be-

For five days and five nights the main hall will be open to the largest group of exhibitors ever known here.

There will be seeds, canned goods, prize apples, cows, hogs, chickers, everything the farm, the kitchen and the home produces open to public

Out side there will be the laughter of the gay crowd as they await their turn to get on the rides, enter the shows and get a "Bingo" card.

The Fair this year will eclipse any other event ever held in Cherokee county, the officials believe.

Competition is not limited to Cherokee county, but is open to surrounding counties and communities in North Carolina and Georgia.

Last year some 15,000 merry people passed through the Fair gates. This year W. M. Fain, chairman of the Cherokee County Fair association expects a crowd that will double the capacity of the park. He expects 30,006 attendance.

Entries are to be made early Tuesday. The fair hall has been remodelled and rebuilt so as to insure ample room for every display. Provisions will be made for live stock to be on display.

Judging in all departments will be held on Wednesday. The winners of first and second prizes will be announced as soon as possible after the official awards have been made

Those having displays are asked to bring them in early Tuesday and go directly to the head of the department under which they wish to make their exhibit.

The list of superintendents of the various departments and general rules covering exhibitions may be found in one of the Fair catalogs which are offered free to whoever calls for them at either the county agent's office in the court house or

#### Await Completion of Ac-Rally Planned cess Road before Construction Begins

No additional appreciable number of workmen will be hired for the Hiawassee dam project until the principal access road from Turtletown Tenn., into the dam site is completed and the hauling of machinery for building the dam and housing con-struction is begun, W. M. Rogers head of the TVA personell offices here, said Monday.

The first of the week Mr. Rogers office was moved to the knitting mill from the court house where it has been maintained for the past two months. Plans were made for the removal of all other TVA offices in Murhpy there this week.

Mr. Rogers said that no workmen would be neceded until actual construction was begun on the He said it might be several months before more men were put

He said the building of dormitories houses and offices would be the next step and that the work would be done the construction and maintenance division of the TVA.

When the access road is completed machinery used in building Norris dam will be transferred here and the construction department will begin their work, he declared.

There is no connection between the two divisions, and each has a super-intendant of its own, he added. Mr. Rogers also stated that 125
