

# TELICO FALLS BEFORE MURPHY GUNS SATURDAY

## Home Team Hope for Sixteenth Straight Victory At Knoxville

In a slow, ragged game, Murphy edged a 6 to 0 victory over a stubborn Tellico Plains team here Saturday, November 7, 1936. Barnett's kicking and running kept the home team undefeated. He was the spark plug in the attack. O. Taylor, Woods, Nichols, Rowland and Cole also played a good ball game.

This was the 15th straight victory for the home team and it is hoped that the local team will remain that way after their game with the Knoxville Central High School Bobcats at Mountain City, Tenn., this Friday afternoon, November 13, 1936.

The big red and black Central High has not been defeated in 19 straight games, and have only lost one game in three years. They were state champions of Tennessee last year, and will be hard to beat on their own field.

The Bobcats have a good aerial attack that has not failed to click this year, which is shown by the large score they have run up on their opponents, which is in the neighborhood of 280 points to 18 for the opponents.

A large crowd from Murphy is expected to go and support the local team, but several of the people of Murphy will go to support Central High, as there are several graduates from Central High here in Murphy.

### PLAY BY PLAY

Leatherwood kicked off to Carringer on the 15 yard line. He returned to his own 17. T. Hunt slipped off left guard for a 9 yard gain. Here Tellico was penalized for off-sides. Lance circled left end for 4 yards. H Taylor made the tackle. Woods stopped Ferguson with a 2 yard gain. A 40 yard punt by Lance was received by Barnett, who was tackled almost in his tracks by H. Hunt. Mauney found 3 yards on a

gain. Taylor drove over the line for five yards, stopped by White. Tate tackled Barnett with no gain, but Tellico was penalized for being off-sides, making a first down for Murphy. Johnson stepped off 4 yards at left tackle, stopped by T. Hunt. Mauney passed to O. Taylor for 7 yards, making another first down. Mauney carried 3 yards through the line before being tackled by Carringer. Johnson made 4 at right tackle. Carringer intercepted Taylor's pass, the ball returning to Tellico. T. Hunt was stopped by Leatherwood after a ten yard gain. Again Hunt takes the ball trying a line play over Smith, but failed to gain. The same play is again attempted and still with no gain. Lance punted 45 yards to Barnett. Mauney was stopped by Tate after making 5 yards through the line. Johnson tried right guard for a yard gain. Barnett tried the line with no gain so he next punts 30 yards to Ferguson as the quarter ended.

#### Second Quarter

Carringer stepped off 5 yards at right tackle, being stopped by Woods. 5 yards was made by T. Hunt before being tackled by Smith. An incomplete pass was thrown by Lance. Lance punted 40 yards to Barnett who returned 5 yards where he was hit by Hawkins. Mauney found two yards over guard. Taylor carried 4 yards through the line where he was downed by Hunt. A first down was made when Mauney gained 15 yards on an end run. Barnett tried the line with no gain. Johnson hit left guard for 7 yards. Mauney was stopped at right end by Tate with a 2 yard gain. Barnett made a first down when he sneaked over guard for 3 yards. Taylor drove over left end for a 25 yard gain. Johnson smacked the line for 3 yards, then added 3 more on the same play. Mauney passed to H. Taylor, illegal man for the pass, so Murphy was penalized by the ball being returned to Tellico. T. Hunt tried the line with no gain, Leatherwood stopping him. Tellico was penalized 15 yards for holding. Hunt was tackled by Nichols with no gain. Ferguson made one at right tackle. Lance punted 40 yards to Barnett who returned 10 yards as the half ended.

#### Third Quarter

Hawkins kicked off 40 yards to Mauney who returned 10 yards before he was stopped by White. Mauney's pass to Luckett was incomplete. Again Tellico was penalized for holding. Mauney picked up 6 yards at the line where he was stopped by Tate. Barnett dived through

center for a 3 yard gain. O. Taylor made a first down by smacking 4 yards through the line. An incomplete pass was thrown by Taylor. Ferguson intercepted a pass by Mauney. Ferguson was snaggged by H. Taylor with no gain. Carringer made no gain when he tried a line play over Nichols. Ferguson then punted 30 yards to Johnson who returned 5. Mauney was spilled for a 2 yard loss on a try at right end. Taylor threw a pass which was knocked down by Hawkins. Barnett made 6 yards and on the following play punted 40 yards to Ferguson. Luckett tackling him. T. Hunt tried a play over Nichols with no gain. Lance was thrown for a two yard loss by Luckett. Ferguson punted 30 yards to Barnett. Six yards was gained by Taylor but Murphy was penalized for clipping from behind.

#### Fourth Quarter

Mauney carried with no gain, H. Hunt stopping him. Johnson was tackled by Lance with a 6 yard gain. Barnett punted 40 yards and Ferguson returned 10. Carringer completed a 5 yard pass to Hawkins. Barnett intercepted a pass by Hawkins and raced 60 yards down the field to be tackled only 8 yards from the goal line by Carringer. Taylor smacked the line for a 3 yard gain being stopped by Hawkins. Barnett made two at right tackle. Johnson fumbled the ball but Mauney recovered. The ball was brought within a foot of the line when Tellico was penalized for off-sides. Mauney hit the line for the one and only touch-down of the game. Barnett failed to make the extra point. Leatherwood kicked off 40 yards to T. Hunt who returned 20 yards before being hit by H. Taylor. Hunt was stopped by Cole with no gain. Ferguson tried a play over Smith, also failing to gain. T. Hunt sneaked 1 yard through the line where he was tackled by Woods. Lance punted 40 yards to Barnett who returned 5. Hunt downed Mauney, having made 1 yard. Barnett found 4 yards over guard. Johnson failed to gain but one yard so Barnett punted 40 yards to Ferguson who returned five where he was stopped by Woods. Ferguson was downed by Mauney with no gain. T. Hunt made 4 yards before being hit by Rowland. An incomplete pass was thrown by Lance. H. Taylor threw Tellico for a 12 yard loss when Lane attempted to punt. Tellico was penalized for off-sides. Barnett circled around end for 5 yards ending one of the hardest games Murphy has as yet played.
