

Kelley Bennett Will Not Call 2nd Primary

Dr. Kelley E. Bennett, of Bryson City, second high man in the race for the Democratic nomination for the state senate in the 33rd district, has decided against calling a second primary. R. B. Morphew, of Robbinsville, was high man.

Dr. Bennett, in a letter to Raymond C. Maxwell, executive secretary of the state board of elections, Raleigh, said:

"This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of June 15, in which you advise that by virtue of receiving the second highest number of votes cast in the recent primary for the office of state senator in the 33rd senatorial district, I am entitled to request a second primary in the district, if same be made within five days from June 14.

"While I appreciate the value of the office and realize it is worth any sacrifice I might be called on to make personally, after giving the matter considerable thought, I have decided that, inasmuch as the district covers five counties, the expense of a second primary would be too heavy to justify another primary, and since this expense would have to be borne by the people of my district, I believe my decision not to call a second primary will be in accord with their judgment and wishes.

"This is, therefore, to authorize you, insofar as my candidacy for the office of state senator from the 33rd district is concerned to certify Hon. R. B. Morphew the duly elected candidate."

Two Men Are Killed By Train

Gordon Jones, 38, of Sylva, and Arthur Rowland, 30, of Tomotla, were killed Sunday afternoon when they were struck by an eastbound Southern Railway freight train three miles west of Sylva. The accident occurred at 2 o'clock on a curve near the Cowee tunnel.

Jess Elders told investigating officers he and the two men had been walking along the tracks. He left the two on the tracks, he said, to go to a nearby house, returning some time later, to find the two had been killed. He said he believed Jones and Rowland went to sleep on the tracks while waiting for him.

Both men were decapitated by the wheels of the double-header freight.

Jones is survived by his wife and three sons, Rufus, 8, Jimmie 6, and Jackie, 4. He leaves also his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Jones, six brothers, Shaster, Garland, Donnell, Aud, Ause and Wayne all of Sylva, and two sisters, Mrs. Ethel Welch and Miss Dora Jones both of Sylva.

Rowland was the son of Nick Rowland, of Tomotla. He is survived by a wife and four children.

Sheriff Mason, Of Jackson, Is Buried

Funeral services were held at the Dillsboro Methodist church Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock for Charles C. Mason, sheriff of Jackson county, who was shot and almost instantly killed early Thursday morning when he went to serve sanity hearing papers on Donald Ashe, a recluse, who resided in the Ashe settlement about three and a half miles from Sylva.

After shooting the sheriff, Ashe ended his own life with a bullet from a pistol.
