## North Carolina CCC To Enroll 1600 Boys During Month of April

Approximately 1600 boys will be enrolled in CCC camps in North Carolina between April 1 and April 30, according to an announcement by T. L. Grier, supervisor of CCC election, this week.

Unemployed young men who are interested in the opportunities CCC offers and who have a desire for camp life and work experience may apply for entrance at the local welfare office in the Murphy courthouse any time. Enrollments are now made eight times a year.

To be eligible for CCC selection, a young man must be: a citizen of the United States, unemployed and in need of employment, of good character, between the ages of 17 and 23, unmarried, not in attendance at school, and physically and mentally fit to do vigorous work.
