Nelson H. Rogers, aged 87, died at the home of his son Neil on Shooting Creek at one o'clock Saturday morning, following a stroke of paralysis. He had been ill for several months.

Funeral services were held at the Bethel Methodist church Saturday afternoon with the Rev. Dennis Daniels and the Rev. Hogsd officiating. Interment was in the church yard, with Ivie Funeral Home in charge.

John M. Garren Dead At Age of 91 years; 4 Generations At Rites

Death claimed one of the County's oldest and best loved citizens on Friday, June 6, when John M. Garren passed on at the age of 91 years three months and 14 days. Widely known throughout all this section, he had lived all of his 64 years of married life on the same farm in the Wolf Creek section.

Left to mourn him is his widow, Sarah M. Garren who celebrated her 82nd birthday last week; one son, W. L. Garren, and two daughters: Mrs. Riley Morgan and Mrs. Will Burgess. All were at his bedside when the end came. He left, also, eleven grandchildren, nine great grandchildren, and one great-great grandchild. All these were present at the funeral, except two.

Mr. Garren also is survived by one brother, Calvin, of Ellijay, Ga. and a host of other relatives and friends. He was laid to rest in the Macedonia Baptist church cemetery last Saturday evening. The Rev. O. P. Bell conducted the services, assisted by the Rev. Freed Townson. Townson Funeral Home was in charge.

The immediate cause of Mr. Garren's death was a Cerebral Hemorrhage which took place early in the morning of May 3. A very large crowd gathered from all sections of the country to attend the rites.

begin to be called to camp is problematical. It may be that they will not be summoned until the fire has been completely exhausted. On the other hand there is talk in Washington, of amending the draft system so as to give deferment to all who were 27 years old or more when they registered last October. This might get the new draftees into camp in the near future.

Castling about for a reason why Cherokee County should be passed by so frequently, despite the fact that its quota lacks 31 men of being complete, Secretary Walker finally suggested that the action may have been taken because of the high percentage of acceptances with which this section's credited. Of the 63 men sent to camp, only nine have been rejected. Eight of these were sent home for physical reasons, and one was sent back because he could not read or write.

Against this record Gastonia is said to have had 25 out of 26 men sent back and Franklin is reported to have gotten back nine out of ten sent.
