Approximately \$216,000 has been distributed in Cherokee County under the Social Security Act, through June 30th, 1941, A. L. Fletcher, Chairman of the N. C. Unemployment Compensation Commission estimated

Fletcher said old age assistance, through last June 30, amounted to \$82,462.04 in this county; aid to dependent children amounted to \$34,-122.35, and aid to the blind amounted to \$6,687.62.

No county figures are available for old age and survivers insurance. Monthly payments in this division started after January 1, 1940, due to a 1939 amendment, after lump-sum payments for three years.

Chairman Fletcher pointed out that more than \$186,000 was distributed in this county to last July 1, in four of the five major divisions of survivors insurance.

The other five divisions, classed as "services," are handled by State Departments.
