Prison Camp Inmates Treated Well, Declares Superintendent Hall

The Scout is glad to print the following statement from Superintendent J. E. Hall, of the Prison Camp at Peachtree. The Scout takes this opportunity to state that no criticism of Mr. Hall, or his aides was intended in the article he refers to. It was printed merely as a matter of news, brought to the Scout by two former prisoners who claimed to have been parties to the alleged strike. Mr. Hall's statement follows, in full:

"In reply to the article that appeared in this paper last week in regard to the prisoners located at the Cherokee County Prison Camp, the camp was badly misrepresented in regard to clothing, food and medical attention.

"We have had two guards, John Pulliam and Claud Jones who have been employed by the North Carolina Prison Department and stationed here at this camp for the last nine years. These guards say these prisoners of this camp have had the best care in food, clothing and medical attention that could be given them under the laws of this State.

"I, J. E. Hall, the superintendent, and Bartley Millsaps, the Steward, of the Cherokee County Prison Camp invite the citizens of the State of North Carolina to visit this camp on any day that may be convenient, and just see for themselves how bad the author of last weeks article misrepresented us regarding treatment and care of the prisoners at the Cherokee County Prison Camp."

U. S. Is Talking Over State Jobs Bureau On New Year's Day

The County set-up of the State Unemployment Service, with headquarters in the Court house at Murphy, but functioning all over Cherokee, has been ordered transferred, on the first of the year, to the Federal Government. There are only two county employes: Charles Calhoun, in charge, and Mrs. Wayne Walker, his secretary and assistant.

The transfer is part of a national program, under which the U. S. is taking over all State unemployment services in the nation. No changes have been made, or are planned, either in personnel, or in salaries.

"About the only difference I can find" said Calhoun, "is that hereafter we will get pay checks from Uncle Sam instead of from the State."

The transfer may serve, however, to make the jobs more permanent. Unemployment service posts in North Carolina have been under State Civil Service. It is expected that a blanket order will be issued, placing all such employes who can meet requirements as to length of service, under United States Civil Service. This will just about make them lifetime jobs.

The work of the County unemployment office has undergone a striking change since the outbreak of war, according to Calhoun.

"The office used to be busy filing applications for men and women wanting jobs", he said. "Now it is just the other way around. We are busy now listing jobs, hunting men and women to fill them."

"There are a whole lot more jobs than there are people to fill them."

James Abbot Hyatt, of Warne, who recently enlisted in the U. S. Navy placed fourth in tests of 150 recruits seeking assignment to one of the Navy's training schools. Young Hyatt will be given special training in the Aviation machinist school at Norfolk, Va.
