U. S. Has Enough Wheat To Last Two Years, Yet Prices Are Going Up

The big baking companies recently brosted the price of bread. In the face of this boost comes a report by V/. Herbert White, Caswell county furmer and member of the State AAA committee, that there is enough wheat on hand to supply both domest's needs and exports for

Mr. White made this statement as wheat farmers prepared to vote Saturday May 2 on marketing quotas. He said the nation's wheat supply on July 1942 i s estimated at 1,423,444,-000 bushels. This includes an ex pected yield this year of 793,000,000 bushels, added to a 630,000,000 bushels carry-over.

This amount, White added, not only supply domestic and export needs, but will allow a 30 percent margin for safety.
