

U. S. Has Enough Wheat To Last Two Years, Yet Prices Are Going Up

The big baking companies recently boosted the price of bread. In the face of this boost comes a report by W. Herbert White, Caswell county farmer and member of the State AAA committee, that there is enough wheat on hand to supply both domestic needs and exports for two years.

Mr. White made this statement as wheat farmers prepared to vote Saturday May 2 on marketing quotas. He said the nation's wheat supply on July 1942 is estimated at 1,423,444,000 bushels. This includes an expected yield this year of 793,000,000 bushels, added to a 630,000,000 bushels carry-over.

The amount, White added, will not only supply domestic and export needs, but will allow a 30 percent margin for safety.

\$5,000 Limit Is Placed On All Highway Work

This is because, according to an announcement from Raleigh, the State Highway and Public Works Commission has ruled that the recent blanket order by the War Production Board limiting construction of any time above \$5,000 applies to building of roads and highway structures.
