## 1638 NYA Students **Receive Employment**

A total of 1,638 North Carolina boys and girls received employment during the first quarter of 1942 as a result of training and work experience gained on projects of the Na-tional Youth Administration, State NYA Administrator John A. Lang announced today.

Of the large number placed in obs as a result of NYA training, only 24 went into public employment.

Nincty NYA boys volunteered for active duty and were accepted by the armed forces during the same period and 28 others entered through Selective Service. Few NYA youths are within the age-group for military duty, Lang said in politiling out small number drafted from NYA projects during the three months' period.

A total of 452 young people went to jobs with firms having war contracts, while scores of others replaced men calle dinto military service.

Largest placements were recorded in textiles, with 216; shipbuilding, 178; agriculture, 222; construction, 92; wholesale and retail trade, 105; service industries, 229; domestic service, 150; and furniture, 49.

Placements during the quarter

consisted of 1,062 boys and 576 gtria By months, placements were Janu. ary, 501; February 495; and March 642


