Baxter C. Jones

Announces His Candidacy For Solicitor

Baxter C. Jones, of Swain, is a candidate for solicitor of this district, opposing the veteran solicitor, John M. Queen. Mr. Jones believes that he will be nominated in the primary on May 30.

Baxter Jones was born in Jackson county, and reared here, on the waters of Savannah creek, a member of one of the Jackson county's prominent democratic families. He was educated in the public schools of county, and at Western Carolina Teachers College and at the University of North Carolina. Mr. Jones taught in this county, and was elected to represent the county in the General Assembly where he served with distinction. After earning his license to practice law, Mr. Jones removed to Swain county, where he has been one of the prominent citizens and an ardent worker in the democratic ranks, and in civic, church and fraternal affairs. Swain county returned him to the General Assembly, where he served two consecutive terms, and where he became known as one of the prominent members of the House of Representatives, with considerable prestige. respect and with interest whenever it was raised in the councils of the House or in the committee rooms.

Because of his interest in furthering the cause of Western Carolina Teachers College and in building it into a great institution of learning, the Governor of North Carolina appointed him a member of the board of trustees of the institution from which he graduated. On the board of trustees he proved to be the most valuable member in guiding the affairs of the college.

In recognition of this work in the General Assembly and in the councils of the democratic party, Governor Broughton appointed Mr. Jones a member of the State Board of Elections. He resigned this post in order to make the race for solicitor.

In the last solicitorial primary, Mr. Jones was a candidate, and the large vote he received, not only in the western counties of the district, but also in Haywood, brought him into greater prominence throughout the district, and in all the western end of the state. Mr. Jones has been a successful practitioner at the Swain county bar, for a long number of years, and his practice has taken him to the courts in all the counties of the district, giving him a wide acquaintance in Haywood, Jackson, Macon, Swain, Clay, Cherokee, and Graham, the counties that comprise the 20th judicial district.

Being a World War Veteran, Mr. Jones is a member of the American Legion. He is a Mason, and a member of the Loyal Order of Moose.

Sixty four members of the TVA working force at Nottely dam held a banquet at Regal hotel here Saturday night. Among those present were: E. D. Snoddy, assistant superintendent; W. F. 1,638 NYA Students Receive Employment

A total of 1,638 North Carolina boys and girls received employment during the first quarter of 1942 as a result of training and work experience gained on projects of the National Youth Administration. State NYA Administrator John A. Lang announced today.

Of the large number placed in jobs as a result of NYA training, only 24 went into public employment.

Ninety NYA boys volunteered for active duty and were accepted by the armed forces during the same period and 28 others entered through Selective Service. Few NYA youths are within the age-group for military duty, Lang said in pointing out the small number drafted from NYA projects during the three months' period.

A total of 452 young people went to jobs with firms having war contracts, while scores of others replaced men called into military service.

Largest placements were recorded in textiles, with 216; shipbuilding, 173; agriculture, 222; construction, 92; wholesale and retail trade, 105; service industries, 229; domestic service, 150; and furniture, 49.

Placements during the quarter

consisted of 1,062 boys and 576 girls. By months, placements were January, 501; February 495; and March, 642.
