# Murphy Nine Defeats Hayesville 2 Games

Murphy's baseballers opened the season in fine style at Hayesville Sunday with a double-barreled victory behind the sensational hurling of Candler Nations, 5-1 and 8-4.

Pitching for the first time this year, Nations was invincible in the first game as he struck out 13 hitters and allowed but five hits. Two were out in the final inning when Hayesville scored their lone marker. After a few moments rest, Nations came back to subdue the Clay Countians again on seven hits and as many strike-outs.

The opener rocked along with no scoring until the fifth canto when Murphy tallied thrice. Wayne Palmer led off with a single and Jerry Mallonee advanced him to third with another single. "Bear" Palmer's long fly was dropped by the left fielder and the first tally came across. Nations then singled Mallonee across and Plott singled Palmer home.

Crawford homered to deep center-field to add one in the sixth and the final tally came in the seventh when Plott again drove in a mate.

Hayesville's lone run came after McClure's third hit of the game and a pinch single by Jack Bristol. Nations struck out pinch-hitter Kitchens to end the game.
