Uriel Vivian Baker And Mack Edward Smith, Jr., Are Wed At Andrews Saturday

Following Wedding Trip, Couple Will Live In Charlotte

Miss Uriel Vivian Baker, daughter of the Rev. Exum Farrel Baker of Andrews, became the bride of Mack Edward Smith, Jr., son of Mr. Mack Edward Smith and the late Mrs. Martha Fields Smith of Fountain, Saturday evening, July 11, at the First Baptist church in Andrews.

Rev. E. P. Baker, father of the bride and pastor of the church officiated. Seven-branched candelabra with lighted tapers and two large floor baskets of white gladioli, stocks, carnations and gypsophylla were placed on either side of the altar. A large white arch entwined with ivy bearing tall lighted tapers was placed against a background of mountain fern, hemlock and ivy. Pews were marked with bouquets of Queen Ann's lace tied with tulle. Large urns of pastel Queen Anne's lace were placed in both vestibules of the church.

A program of nuptial music was presented by Harry Morrell church organist, and Mrs. Earle Messer of Waynesville, cousin of the bride, soloist. Prior to the ceremony the organist played Schubert's Serenade and "Indian Love Call" by Rudolf Friml, "To a Wild Rose" by McDowell was played softly during the ceremony. Mrs. Messer's numbers included "I Love You Truly" by Carrie Jacobs Bond and "Sweetest Story ever Told" by Stults. The bridal chorus from "Lohengrin" by Wagner was used as the processional and Mendelssohn's wedding march was played as the recessional.
