Many who are able to purchase plenty of everything are the victims of malnutrition and malnutrition means retarded growth, unsteady nerves, tired bodies and lack of initiative. In wartime it is the duty of every American to keep physically fit and proper diet is a great factor in promoting good health.

The second factor that makes a knowledge of food values important is the rising cost of food. How to feed a family when many of meats fruits and vegetables, we are used to buying freely are almost out of reach of the average budget is a distressing problem.
