Forest Fires Are Hazard To War Production Effort

A forest fire occurred on Allens Ridge near Jenks Branch, 15 miles northwest of Murphy on November 3. This fire burned over approximately 20 acres of private land before it was finally brought under control by Ranger Schaap of Murphy. It was apparently caused by the carelessness of hunters prowling through the woods.

Due to the shortage of Forest Service personnel it was necessary to delay scaling sawtimber on a National Forest sale being operated by the Gennett Lumber Company. The Gennett Lumber Company is currently engaged in producing timber for Army and Navy contracts.

Any diversion of Forest Service personnel to put out fires is a total loss to everyone in manpower, and materials destroyed. Everyone should be careful with fires. Penalties for malicious or accidental setting of fires are very heavy during these war times.

Trucks, Buses, Out Of State Cars Are Speed Offenders

Raleigh, N. C.—Out of state cars, buses and tractor-truck-semitrailers are the worst offenders in breaking the 35 mph victory speed limit, according to data secured by James S. Burch, Engineer of Statistics and Planning for the N. C. State Highway Commission.

Using special stop watch devices on several primary North Carolina highways, Burch clocked 1121 vehicles. Findings from these checks showed only 41 per cent of all drivers are complying strictly with the 35 mile speed limit. Another 30 per cent are driving from 36 to 43 miles per hour and the other 29 per cent are better than 40 miles per hour, 11 per cent of whom do better than 45.

From a 1940 speed check, Burch says the average peace time speed was 44 miles per hour. This has now been reduced to 37. Burch's figures show that 56 per cent of out of state cars are traveling better than 40 miles while only 33 per cent of local cars are so doing.

Half of the buses on the highways and 41 per cent of the big tractor-trailer truck outfits are also running faster than 40.

Burch came to the support of trucks and buses engaged in vital war transportation by pointing out that on most such vehicles, "high gear" cannot be reached until a speed of 40 miles per hour is reached. Burch also pointed out that truck and bus driver changing points as well as shops are designed for a better than 40 mile average. Schedules are also interfered with due to speed decrease.

Best compliance is by farmer, Burch stated, but the engineer pointed out that many farm trucks traveled faster than 35 before the victory speed went into effect.

All checks were made on rural highways and Burch says the further the average driver gets from a town the faster his speed. Checks represent every section of North Carolina.

State Highway Patrolmen turned in 1500 speed violators to the State OPA during September and 1700 during October.
