## Despite An Increase **Coble Dairy Products** Needs More Milk

Dairy Products is paying an increased price of 20c a hundred for milk if a producer has an electric cooler and practices simple sanitary regulations.

The firm is now receiving about 33 percent more milk than it was on June 23 when the business was taken over from Southern Dairies. Farmers in this area have pledged to produce approximately double that amount, and the company is hoping that within a short time this will be accomplished.

During the past two months more than 100 cows have been bought by dairymen on the milk routes.

The firm has installed condensing equipment here, and it is expected that it will be ready for condensing milk by September 15. Several major repairs and changes have been made at the plant, and the firm is able now to handle any quantity of milk the farmers can


