Milk Price Increases To \$3 Per Hundred

Coble Dairy Products, Inc., announce an advance in milk prices. that will revert back to January 16. The company is now paying \$3 per hundred pounds for four per cent butterfat milk, \$3.40 for five per cent; \$3.80 for five per cent which is electrically cooled.

With the U.S. subsidy payments, through the AAA, a producer with five per cent cooler milk will receive \$4.70 per hundred pounds, or
