call attention to the following laws in regard to what to do on approach of police or fire department vehicles:

1. Upon the approach of any giving audible signal by bell, siren or exhaust whistle, the driver of Dale Lee every other vehicle shall immediately drive the same to a position os near as possible and parallel to the right-hand edge or curb, clear of any intersection of highways. and shall stop and remain in such position unless otherwise directed by a police or traffic officer until bicle shall have passed.
