

To Assist With State Income Tax Returns

North Carolina State Income Tax Returns are due to be filed on or before March 15.

A single person with an income of \$1,000 or more, or a married man with an income of \$2,000 or more is required to file a State Income Tax Return. A married woman with a separate income of \$1,000 or more from that of her husband, is required to file a return.

Taxpayers who have previously filed should use forms received which bear their names and addresses.

Failure to receive a form does not relieve a person of liability to file.

A local representative of the N. C. Department of Revenue can be contacted at the office in Townson Bldg., Murphy, March 12-13-14-15, who will be available to give assistance in filing returns.

Court Upholds Jenkins Act On Cigarettes

The Supreme Court upheld Monday, a law which helps 40 states in collecting taxes on out-of-state cigarette purchases. The law in question, the Jenkins Act, was challenged by the Consumer Mail Order Association and its associated members. It requires monthly reports and regulates the interstate handling of the cigarette trade. The decision handed down by a special three-judge U. S. district court was reviewed at Washington and its decision affirmed.

A cigarette buying agency in Murphy said that despite the U. S. Supreme Court decision it will continue to withhold its sales records from state tax collectors. Joseph H. Wilson of the Cooperative Buying Service was quoted as saying he does not consider the law to cover individual purchases such as he makes for out-of-state buyers.

Cherokee Is A Healthy County

Ten less people died in Cherokee county during 1950 than did in 1949, according to Joe Higdon, Register of Deeds. There were 159 deaths in 1950 as against 169 in 1949.

Births in the county are diminishing. A total of 538 births were listed for 1950, compared with 566 in 1949, and 678 in 1948.

There were 127 marriage certificates issued in 1950.

Comparing 159 deaths with 538 births shows that 3.4 births occur for each death, indicating increasing population.



Sgt. J. T. Hancock Awarded Bronze Star Medal

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Marine Sgt. James T. Hancock, son of Mrs. Annalee Hancock of Route One, Murphy, N. C., has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal, with combat "V", for heroic achievement in connection with operations against the enemy in Korea.

The citation which accompanied the award lauded Sergeant Hancock for his actions while serving as a squad leader with a Marine rifle platoon.

During a night counterattack of enemy infantry supported by tanks on his platoon positions, Sergeant Hancock fearlessly, and without regard for his own personal safety, exposed himself to the enemy fire to assist in the destruction of the lead enemy tank.

Seizing an un-manned bazooka, the sergeant ran forward to an exposed position and fired such effective and accurate fire that the enemy tank and the crew were destroyed. By his actions the platoon was materially aided in successfully repelling the enemy counterattack.
