Bond Sales In December Total \$11,969

County U. S. Savings Bonds Chairman, W. D. Whitaker announced recently that sales of Series E, F and G Bonds in Cherokee County for the month of December totalled \$11,969. Of this amount \$11,969 was in Series E Bonds, none in Series F Bonds, and none in Series G Bonds.

The sales figures for North Carolina's 100 counties were as follows: Series E Bonds \$3,187,551; Series F Bonds \$62,548.50; Series G Bonds \$276.50, total \$3,250,599.

The county chairman called attention to the law passed by Congress in March allowing Series E Bonds to extend another 10 years after maturity. When E Bonds mature owners need only to continue to hold on to them and they will continue to draw interest automatically for another 10 years. He pointed out that an \$18.75 E Bond purchased in 1941 will bring \$33.33 in 1961.

"Almost \$4 billion in E Bonds will mature in 1952," Mr. Whitaker said. "It is important to our nation's economy that owners of maturing E Bonds take advantage of the extension law and hold on to the Bonds, and it is also important
