"In April 30 years ago the Murphy Carnegie Library opened its

doors to try to bring people and books together A few years before this an interested group of women, the Murphy Woman's Club, and the town officials envisioned library service for our town. They contacted the Andrews Carnegie Foundation, which agreed to give \$7,500 to build a library if the town would provide a site and support the library. For this the town paid \$2,000.

"In order to open the library in 1922, the mayor, Don Witherspoon, gave his salary to pay a librarian. Miss Mary Norvall was the first librarian. The first trustees were: M. W. Bell, chairman, C. M. Sneed, J. B. Story, Mrs. G. W. Candler, Mrs. J. H. Dillard, and Mrs. L. Kimsey.

"Weth the coming of T. V. A. for

"With the coming of T. V. A. fo our midst in 1937, they wanted library service for their employees, so a contract was drawn up between T. V. A. and the library to provide this service. Through the efforts of many interested peo-

the efforts of many interested peo-ple, Cherokee County voted a M-brary tax in 1940.

"The Nantahala Regional Nora-ry consisting of three counties is the outgrowth of the contract be-tween Murphy Library and T. V. A. Its headquarters are in Mur-phy Library.

"The city fathers have certainly contributed to making the library more attractive.

"However, with the progress that has been made, considering the growth of our town we are not satisfied with the service we are rendering. Many books wear out each year, so we need more books and want to give better service."

"Our memorial book collection started in 1945, the first one being given by Mr. C. M. Wafford. This is a source of pride, as we have some lovely editions that we would not be able to purchase with our small book fund. We also have a memorial fund started, and this will go for reference books on equipment."
