Savings Bonds Total \$17,481.25

Whitaker announced today that according to the monthly sales report from Allison James, State Director of Savings Bonds in Greensboro, sales of Series E, F and G Bonds in Cherokee County for the month of March totaled \$17,481.25; of this amount \$16,481.25 were in Series E Bonds; none in F Bonds, and \$1,000 in Series G Bonds.

Total Series E, F and G Bond sales for North Carolina's 109 counties were \$2,898,030.50. Of this total \$2,665,422.50 were in F Bonds; \$52,281 in F Bonds, and \$180,600 in G Bonds. March 1952 Series E Bond sales in North Car-

olina exceeded March 1951 sales by \$277,804.50, an increase of 11%. During the first quarter of 1952, E Bond sales in North Carolina exceeded the same period in 1951 by 354,099.

W. E. Kimbrough Participates In Convoy Exercises

The "know how" of successful wartime merchant shipping was recently learned by Wayne E. Kimbrough, aviation chief machinist's mate, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Kimbrough of Marble, N. C.

Members of Patrol Squadron 23 recently completed major convoy exercises in the Atlantic between Long Island and Panama.

The maneuver, known as "Convoy Exercises 3," were realistic in that Navy transports, tankers and cargo ships sailed from New York, Norfolk, and other East Coast ports in the same manner as did Allied convoys of World War II. Opposing them, and attempting to close sea lanes, were "enemy" forces of submarines, surface raiders and land-based patrol bombers.

Petrie Hospital Is On Approved List Of Surgeons

Petrie Hospital of Murphy is one of 3,352 institutions in the United States, Canada and a few other countries that are on the thirty-fourth annual list of hospitals either fully approved or provisionally approved by the American College of Surgeons, as of December 31, 1951.

The survey list in 1951 included 4,111 hospitals of 25 or more beds, of which 81.5% are approved. Of the 3,352 total approvals, 2,991 or 72% are fully approved and 361 or 8.7% are provisionally approved. Petrie has 35 beds.

Every hospital under survey is reconsidered for approval each year. The College conducted 83 initial hospital surveys during 1951. Forty-one of these institutions were awarded full or provisional approval. The Point Rating System, by means of which hospital departments and services are separately evaluated, is employed in the surveys.

The Standard for Hospitals upon which approval is based include the following: fundamental principles: 1. Modern physical plant, assuring the patient safety, comfort and efficient care; 2. Clearly defined organization, duties, responsibilities and relations; 3. Carefully selected governing board with complete and supreme authority; 4. Competent chief executive officer or administrator, well trained in all phases of hospital administration; with authority and responsibility to interpret and carry out the policies of the hospital and authorized by the governing board; 5. Adequate and efficient personnel, properly organized and competently supervised; 6. Organized medical staff for ethical, competent physicians and surgeons; 7. Adequate diagnostic and therapeutic facilities under competent medical supervision; 8. Accurate, complete medical records; 9. Regular group conferences of the administrative staff and of the medical staff for reviewing activities and results; 10. A humanitarian spirit.
