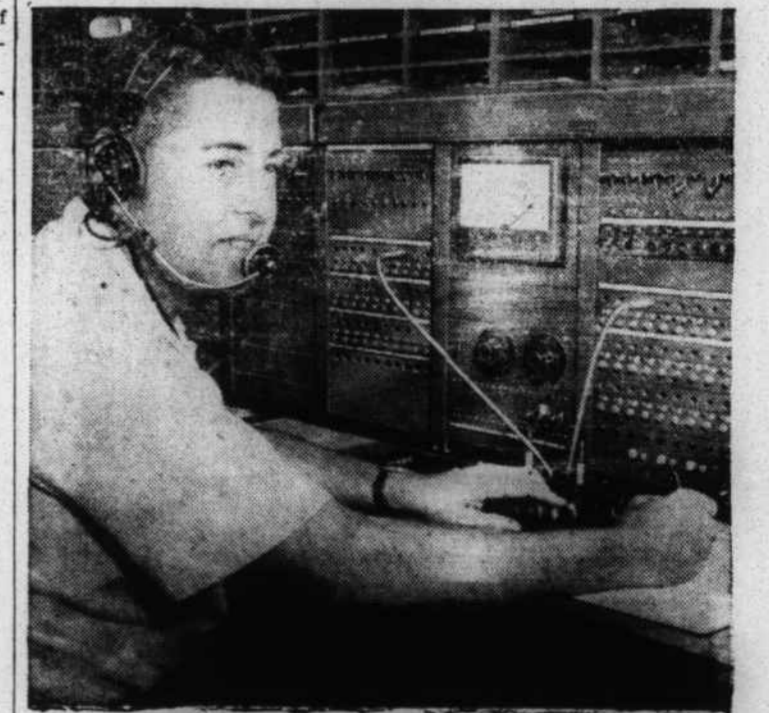
Sarah Williams Suffers Cut

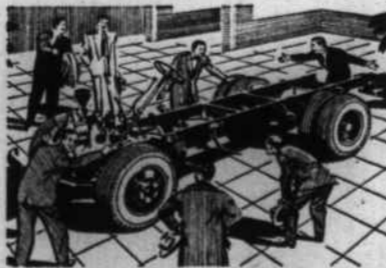

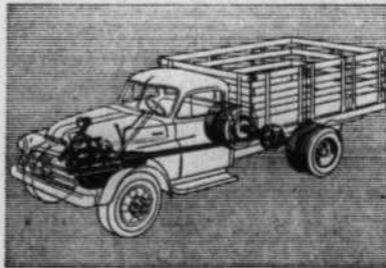
