## Calls Attention To School Laws

The opening date of the Andrews Unit schools is Wednesday, August 27. Supt. Ruffy calls attention to the parents of all children within the school district that the North Carolina school attendance law requires all children between the ages of 7 and 16 to be in school.

For children entering school for the first time, the state requires immunization for small pox, diphtheria and whooping cough. Children can receive these immunizations, free of charge, at the Health Office in Andrews on Thursday afternoon. If preferred immunizations may be given by the family physician.

Children who enter school for the first time must be six years of age on or before October 1, and must enroll during the first month of school.

Compliance with these school laws eliminates misunderstandings and delay in school entrance, says Mr. Ruffy.
