Keener Arrives At Camp Rucker

Camp Rucker, Ala.—Private Harold L. Keener of Route 1, Murphy, N. C., has arrived at this Southern Alabama Army camp to undergo his initial infantry training.

Inducted August 19, 1952, and processed at Ft. Jackson, S. C., he will receive basic training from the 47th "Viking" Infantry Division here. The new soldier will undertake a rigorous schedule incorporating a wide-range of military subjects from military courtesy and field sanitation to machine gun and bazooka familiarization.

After finishing eight to 16 weeks of primary training, the recent inductee will be eligible for reassignment for further infantry or specialized training.

The 47th Division, the first permanent Army assignment for the new soldier, is a Minnesota-North Dakota National Guard unit. Activated for service on Jan. 16, 1951, the Division now is completing its second year at Rucker. Since activation, the 47th has trained men from all 48 states and three territories.

Beef Slaughter Gain Is Shown

North Carolina's commercial slaughtering plants slaughtered a total of 17,238,000 pounds live-weight of meat animals during the month of July, according to the State-Federal Crop Reporting Service. This is a decline of 7 percent from the total liveweight slaughtered in June but is a 13 percent gain over livestock slaughtered in July a year ago.

Of the total liveweight slaugh-

tered during July this year hogs totaled 11,427,000 pounds—a slight decline from June slaughter but still at the record high level established this year. Slaughter of cattle showed an increase of 18 percent from June totaling 6,976,000 pounds liveweight compared with 5,918,000 in June. Liveweight of calves slaughtered was down 4 percent from a month ago with slaughter showing considerable increase.
