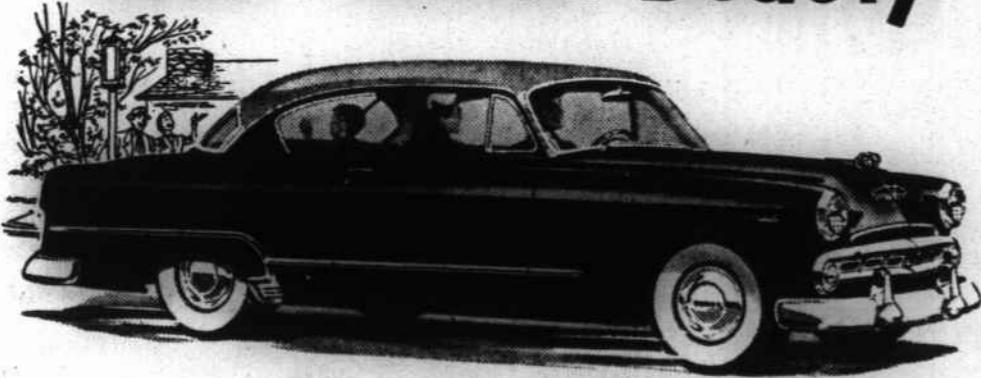
I am sorry that it has been impossible for me to ask all of the voters in the county personally to vote for me so I want to say at this time that I shall be grateful for your vote on November 4.
